- 1. Theology that forms.
- 2. Preparing our hearts before.
- 3. The Call to Worship. Calling us to join in with the worship built into creation.
- 4. Adoration is all about God. We are responding and praising.

(Testimony).

Testimonies are sometimes engaged to give praise to God for the good that He is doing in our congregation and to celebrate what we want to see more of in maturing believers. *These are acts of adoration, not announcements.*

- 1. What God is doing. God is act work in the life of his church, we would be amazed! These are corporate.
- 2. What God has done. Fruit through the ministry.
- 3. How Christ is being Lord. Why we do what we do, connecting our worship to our work. Jesus is ruling.

You: praise. Get it. And get in on it. Do your part. Always do your part.

(Reading).

Corporate readings from the Heidelberg Catechism, Apostle's Creed, book of Common Prayer or Book of Common Worship, serve to focus our minds and hearts and to unite them with the church across history.

- 1. Confessions.
- 2. Creeds.
- 3. Catechism.

You: Adore, confess his worth with the church – local and universal.

The Pastoral Prayer.

"In the last century the great English preacher Charles Spurgeon did not mind sharing his pulpit: others sometimes preached in his home church even when he was present. But when it came to the "pastoral prayer," if he was present, he reserved that part of the service for himself. This decision did not arise out of any priestly conviction that his prayers were more efficacious than others. Rather, it arose from his love for his people, his high view of prayer, his conviction that public prayer should not only intercede with God but also instruct and edify and encourage the saints."

The Pastoral Prayer is offered in praise of this God, on behalf of the needs of our congregation and in preparation for the offering that follows. What a pastor is for the church and why a pastor should pray.

- 1. Pastor as representative, leading congregation before the throne of grace.
- 2. Pastor to labor.
- 3. Pastor to intercede. Cf Horton.

Puritan pastoral prayers changed the world. Prayers are a political act. Jesus is Lord. We need God to act. We need to worship, be shaped by worship. We need to repent of our sin. We need to believe and submit to God. The pastoral prayer is a spiritual battle with the armies of God led by their representative.

Collect:

- 1. Invocation/ address Almighty God
- 2. Acknowledgement unto whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid,
- 3. Request/petition cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of thy Holy Spirit,
- 4. Aspiration that we may perfectly love thee, and worthily magnify thy holy name,
- 5. Pleading . through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen.

You: Adore God. Join in with the prayer, interact with it. Say Amen.

Offering.

We receive an offering from the congregation as an act of gratitude for what God has provided to our families and so that more good can be accomplished with our pooled monies that otherwise might. Offerings are free will for attenders and expected for church members.

- 1. As an act of thanks for provision.
- 2. As an act of <u>faith</u> in future provision.
- 3. 10%? At least.

You: Adore. Receive. Give, regularly and then more. We kill covetousness, entitlement, self-centeredness.

What should be different on Sunday?

- 1. Adore Him! Be ready and attentive to the purpose of your presence. God demands and deserves praise.
- 2. Make the proper connections: theologically, historically. A more substantial adoration matters.
- 3. Join in: the testimony, the readings, the prayers. Engage! Let Leslie feel charged.
- 4. Say Amen to the prayers. A-men! With every amen. Make the walls shake this Sunday.
- 5. Give. Kill and eat!
